

## Answers for the IELTS Listening Diagram Labelling Question - Sample 1

(Note: The text in italics is from the recording to show where the answer is taken from)

#### 1. Solar panel

**Explanation:** It is typical of any system which uses a solar panel to provide hot water.

#### 2. Copper pipe

**Explanation:** Energy in the form of heat is conducted along the back of the solar panel to these copper pipes.

#### 3. Oil or water

**Explanation:** Now... These pipes are filled with a liquid which in turn becomes hot. This can be either oil or water, though oil is usually used.

#### 4. Water tank

**Explanation:** Though oil is usually used. The oil expands and rises up the pipe into the energy exchanger, which is located - up here - in the water tank.

#### 5. Pump

**Explanation:** Sometimes we have to use a pump as well, to help the liquid along. It's a remarkably efficient system, when you think about it.






# **Answers for the IELTS Listening Diagram Labelling Question - Sample 2**

#### 38. Holding tank

**Explanation:** ....sprays the cotton with the pesticides that are in a holding tank under each wing a careful spraying schedule and pattern should be created...

#### 39. Slipstream

**Explanation:** ....if the spray is sent forwards in the direction of the plane's flight the droplets will become too fine and be carried away in the wind or in the slipstream of the plane some of the pesticides of course will hit the right crop





#### 40. Coarse

**Explanation:** ....if the spray is sent backwards from the spray nozzles with regards to the direction of the plane's flight the droplets will be too coarse which will also create uneven results a straight down release creates the optimum medium fine drop of spray

# **IELTS Listening Diagram Labelling Tips**

You don't have to spend excessive effort on this question type—just follow these smart tips to approach diagram labelling effectively:

- Remember, you can listen only once. There's no replay or pause option, so stay completely focused throughout the audio.
- Always check the word limit mentioned in the instructions before you begin writing your answers.
- Carefully read the questions beforehand. Use skimming and scanning techniques to get an idea of what's being asked and where to focus.
- Look at the diagram title (if available). It can give you a quick overview of the topic and help you anticipate the content of the audio.
- Understand the layout and topic of the diagram. Recognizing the structure will guide your listening and make it easier to spot relevant information.
- Identify and underline keywords in the diagram. These words often appear in paraphrased form in the audio.
- Information usually follows a logical order in the recording. Catching this flow will make it easier to follow along and locate answers.
- Build your vocabulary. Since the audio may use synonyms or paraphrased terms, knowing different word forms can help you catch the correct answers.
- Know the type of word expected in each blank—whether it's a noun, verb, adjective, number, or something else.
- Review your practice sessions. Feedback is essential. It helps you identify areas of improvement and strengthen your listening skills.
- No negative marking for incorrect answers—so don't leave any blank. Make educated guesses when unsure.









- Try predicting possible answers based on the diagram before listening. This allows you to simply confirm your predictions while hearing the audio.
- Use visualization techniques. Creating a mental image of the description from the audio can help you map the information onto the diagram.
- Even if unsure about spelling, write something down. Your written answer is what counts, so don't leave it blank just because you're hesitant.
- You'll get 10 minutes at the end of the test to transfer your answers. It's often safer to write just the letter (A, B, C, etc.) when instructed, and always double-check your answers during this time.

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
