What is IELTS Listening Table Completion?

The IELTS Listening Table Completion is a commonly asked question type that can appear in any of the four parts of the test (especially in Parts 1, 2, and 3). It involves listening to an audio recording—either a conversation or a monologue—and completing a table with missing details. These tables usually summarise information grouped under categories like time, place, cost, or features.

Typically, this task consists of around five questions that focus on key information from the recording. The conversations in early parts are often about everyday situations, while Sections 3 and 4 may feature more academic content or seminar-style discussions. You'll need to pick out specific facts or ideas and fill in the gaps with appropriate words or numbers from the audio.

It's crucial to pay close attention to the instructions provided with each question, especially guidelines like "NO MORE THAN TWO WORDS AND/OR A NUMBER." Also, don't confuse Table Completion with Note Completion, as they may appear similar in layout but differ slightly in



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format and focus. Being able to spot this difference can help you manage your time and focus better during the test.

IELTS Listening Table Completion Tips and Strategy (H2)

In the IELTS Listening test, you get only a short time to read the questions before the audio begins. So, it's important to quickly understand what the question is asking and what kind of information you need to listen for. To help you improve, we've put together some proven tips and strategies used by top scorers and IELTS trainers.

1. Understand the Question Type

As soon as you see the table, identify its format—rows and columns with missing details. Read the instructions carefully. If it says "NO MORE THAN TWO WORDS AND/OR A NUMBER," stick to that limit. Writing more than allowed—even if correct—will be marked wrong.

2. Follow the Order

The questions follow the order of the audio. This means you'll hear the information for Question 1 first, then Question 2, and so on. This makes it easier to stay on track while listening.

3. Know Synonyms and Paraphrasing

Often, the words in the recording will be different from those in the table. Learn common synonyms and rephrased terms to spot the right answers.

Examples:

- "Monday to Friday" = "Weekdays"
- "Pen and pencil" = "Stationery items"

4. Watch Out for Distractors

Sometimes, the speaker may mention something and then correct it, or use contrast words like "but," "however," or "despite." These are distractors meant to confuse you. Stay focused and don't rush to write the first thing you hear.

5. Predict Before You Listen

Read through the table before the audio starts and try to guess what type of word might fit (like a date, name, number, or location). This helps your brain focus on listening for the right kind of information.



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6. Transfer Answers Carefully

You'll get 10 minutes at the end to copy your answers to the answer sheet. Write neatly, check your spelling, and follow the word limit. You can write the exact word from the audio or a correct synonym.

7. Don't Leave Blanks—Guess If Needed

If you miss an answer, don't panic. Make an educated guess based on what you heard. There's no negative marking, so it's always better to try than to leave it blank.
