



1. Using Synonyms

One straightforward way to paraphrase is by swapping out certain words in the original sentence or question with their **synonyms**. 2. Restructuring Sentences

Paraphrasing isn't just about changing words; you can also rephrase a sentence by altering its word order. However, when you do this, you'll need to pay close attention to the grammar and might need to add or remove some words. We'll understand this more clearly by looking at an example.

Example:

Original sentence: Some of the methods used in advertising are unethical and unacceptable in today's society. To what extent do you agree with this view?

Paraphrased sentence: Some of the advertising methods nowadays are unethical and unacceptable.









3. Active to Passive Voice Rephrasing

Changing a sentence from **active to passive voice** is an excellent way to paraphrase. When you switch to the passive voice, you're emphasizing the subject that receives the action rather than the person performing it.

Example:

Original sentence: People say obesity is caused by fast foods and aerated drinks. (Active) **Paraphrased sentence:** Obesity is said to be caused by fast foods and aerated drinks. (Passive)

4. Changing the Order of Clauses

A clause is a group of words that includes a subject and a verb. If the question has two clauses, you can **change their order** within the sentence. Let's look at an example to see how this works.

Example:

Original sentence: People become unhealthy because of the sedentary lifestyle. **Paraphrased sentence:** Sedentary lifestyle is one of the reasons that people become unhealthy.

5. Altering Grammatical Forms

Another effective way to paraphrase is by changing the **grammatical form** of words—for instance, converting verbs from positive to negative forms, or transforming nouns into verbs. We'll explore how to change nouns into verbs and how to alter the form of verbs within sentences.

Example

Noun to verb:

College education (noun) - Educated at college (verb)

Verb - positive to negative form:

They **say nothing** about the event held yesterday.

They **didn't say anything** about yesterday's event.


